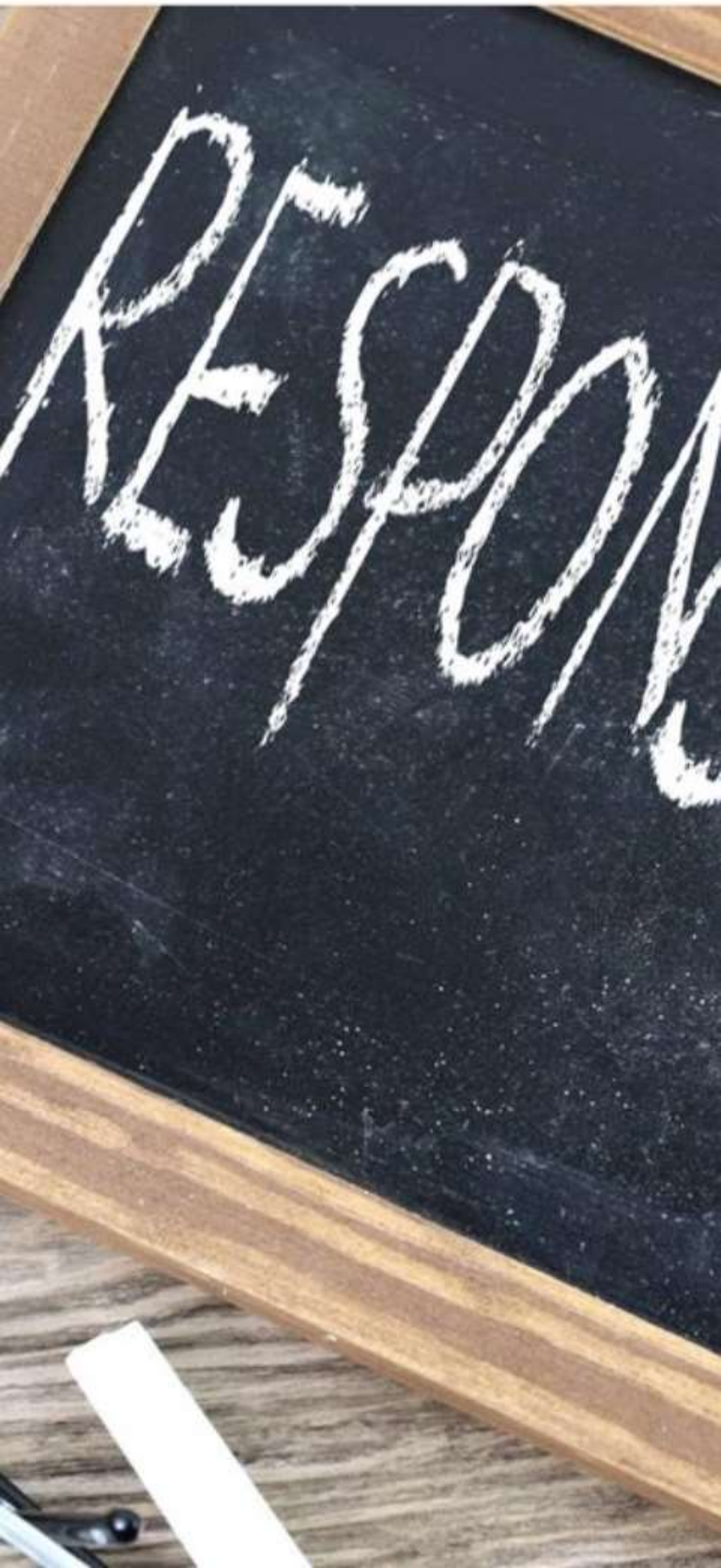

- Ensure that adequate fire fighting equipment is available and is regularly inspected and serviced.
- Encourage open communication and a 'just culture' attitude to Health and

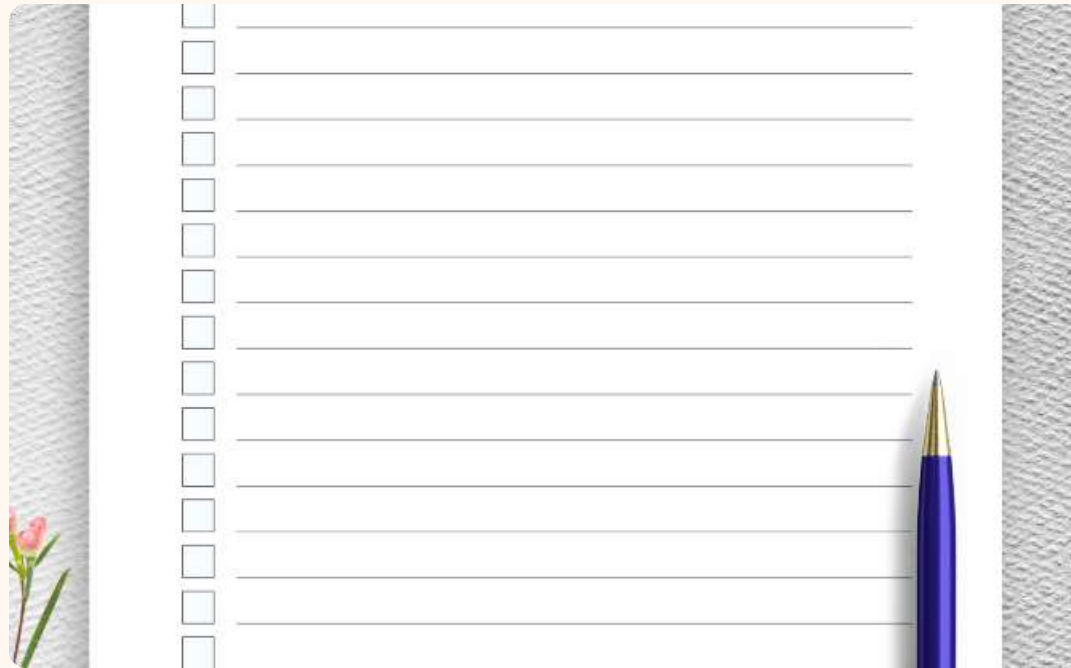
2. Safety Policy and Objectives
